

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April's Meetings Highlights



Select a topic close to your heart, from your personal experience; Use reference material to support your speech; and send a meaningful message for your audience to take home.

Selecting your topic by Robyn Richards

Do you have trouble selecting a topic for your project speeches? Well, you are not the only one having this trouble.

There are many topics we can talk about around us. You just need to be aware of them. Here are 3 major tips on where to look for topic ideas:

Personal Experience: A lot of times, the best speeches come from the heart. Your personal experience may come from: Interests, Career, Education or Family.

Interests—Sport, Travel, Hobbies, Values, Entertainment
Career—Business Processes, Ethics, Investment, Retirement
Education—Memorable Teachers, Achievement, Study Habits, Subjects
Family—Marriage, Child Rearing Insights, Ancestors, Traditions

Reference Material: Use facts and statistics to support your speech. You can find these from sources like Newspapers, Magazines, Books or Websites.

Inspiration: Think about the message you are trying to convey to your audience

Furthermore, reading news, magazines or even interesting facts on social media will definitely help you in expanding your topics boundary. Hope these tips will help you when you are stuck with selecting a speech topic for your project speech.

Know your audience by Peter Jordan

Why do you give a speech?

Giving a speech is more than just having the project ticked off in your Competent Communicator manual. A speech is a powerful tool that communicates your ideas, to persuade people into supporting your view, to educate and inform about a particular topic. Speeches are meaningless without an audience, just like music is nothing if your audience is deaf.

The type of speech you present will depend on your audience. Every audience is different, so you will need to craft your story to suit the audience for effective engagement. To do that, you will need to know your audience—you need to know age, gender, occupation, leisure, work group as well as the venue and how far you are from the audience.

Get to know your audience and let the need of your audience be the guide to the content of the speech. When you have built this engagement effectively, you will find yourselves less nervous and enjoy giving speeches. Easier said than done? This is why joining Toastmasters will give you the opportunity to practice these abilities and improve your communication skills.

District 17 PPP has concluded. Thank you to everyone who has assisted in boosting the PPP points for CVTM. Look forward to the results at the convention in May.




